CHANCE FOR THE GIRLS

Young Americans of Saskatchewan Are Eager For Wives From Home.

Pittsburg, Oct. 18.—Wives are wanted by American settlers in the Canadian Northwest, according to a letter received by Mayor Magee. The letter, which is dated Tantaloon, Saskatchewan, Canada, Oct. 12, follows:

"Dear Sir: A club of young Americans here desires to ask your assistance in a matrimonial way. There are no young women in this part of the country and we have decided upon the means of getting in communication with young women who are matrimonially inclined. Among our members are bankers, merchants, grain dealers, stockmen, one physician, civil and railroad engineers, railroad conductors, cowboys, bookkeepers, etc., etc., any of whom are well placed to abundantly provide for a nice home. This is a beautiful and wealthy country, with most American settlers. We trust you will publish this letter, for which you obligate us deeply."

KILLED BY ELECTRIC SHOCK

Telephone Worker Came In Contact With High Tension Wire.

Hartford, Conn., Oct. 18.—Instant death by electricity came to George A. Fowler, manager of the Farmington Telephone exchange, at Foote's Corner, in West Hartford.

Mr. Fowler was at work at the top of a telephone pole and came in contact with a high tension wire.

Persons saw him fall across the wires and his clothing began to burn, but they were unable to render assistance. Word was sent to the Farmington exchange and the current was turned off, but the body of the man burned on the wires for an hour.

Mr. Fowler was resting the wires at different points when killed. He forty years old and had been employed by the Southern New England Telephone company for several years.

SUICIDE IN CLUBHOUSE

Member of Prominent Carbondale Family Shoots Himself.

Scranton, Pa., Oct. 18.—Early visitors yesterday morning to the Craftsman's club, a Masonic organization of Carbondale, found the body of John L. Morgan, a member of a prominent family, with a revolver by his side. A bullet hole in his breast indicated that he had killed himself.

Morgan, who was 28 years old, had not been in good health for a few months, but of late had shown signs of improvement. He left the city Friday for Banglontown, N. Y., where he was to take charge of a store for his father. His return to Carbondale was not known even by his wife. What impelled him to take his life is unknown.

FOWL CAUSES MURDER

Victim Objected to Accusation That He Had Killed and Eaten One.

Hackensack, N. J., Oct. 18.—James Sprague and Daniel Trainor, both negroes employed in the stable of D. A. Graber of Franklin avenue, Ridge wood, were fast friends until yesterday morning, when the former told Mrs. Graber that Trainor had killed and eaten one of her fowl.

The men quarreled and Sprague shot Trainor with a rifle. The murderer then walked to police headquarters and gave himself up.

"I've killed the big fellow at the barn. It was either him or me and I got him first," said Sprague as he handed over the rifle. Trainor died in the Paterson hospital.

"WITCH" CAUSED INSANITY

Affected Women Lay Trouble to Medicine Administered.

Pottsville, Pa., Oct. 18.—Medicine administered by a Hazleton clairvoyant caused Mrs. John Douglas and Miss Harriet Leggett of this place to become temporarily insane.

Both of the sick women were recommended to the Hazleton "witch" doctor as a person who could cure them. A warrant was sworn out for the arrest of the Hazleton woman for practicing medicine without a license.

Trolleyman Kills Himself.
Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 18.—C. W. McKeely, a trolley conductor, committed suicide last night by shooting. Ill health was the cause.

SOLDIERS' MARCHING ABILITY

General Wood Says More Attention Must Be Paid to Feet of Men.

Washington, Oct. 18.—The annual report of Major General Leonard Wood as commanding officer of the Department of the East for the fiscal year ended June 30 last criticizes the marching ability of the infantry.

"The calls upon the infantry," General Wood said, "are already severe and will increase rapidly in the immediate future, incident to the re-organization of the Hawaiian islands and the Isthmus of Panama. In the infantry special attention should be paid to mobility. Our troops do not march as they should."

"This is due almost wholly to the lack of interest in this feature by the officers, especially commanding officers. In this connection company commanders must give more attention to the feet of their men and see to it that their shoes fit and that their feet are carefully looked after. Sore feet is one of the greatest causes of inefficiency of infantry troops in the field and can be almost wholly avoided if the officers do their duty in looking after the feet of their men."

General Wood recommends an increase of 20 regiments of infantry. The cavalry, he said, should be reorganized and the field artillery should be also increased. He recommended also the re-establishment of the caenn and the creation of a general service corps.

LOSS OF LIFE EXAGGERATED

Governor Eberhardt Reports 32 Dead and \$2,000,000 Property Loss in Forest Fires.

Reports received of the great loss of life in the forest fires of Northern Minnesota were greatly exaggerated by the terror stricken people on the outbreak of fire early in the week. Governor Eberhardt on his return from the north summarized the loss as thirty-two dead and property loss \$2,000,000.

"The fire situation is now well in hand," said the governor, "and already the work of rebuilding homes has started."

"A check has been kept on all relief work done, so it is known just how much clothing and supplies have been distributed. Most of them had insurance on their property, so they will be able to take care of themselves after temporary relief."

French Railway Strike Ended.

The railway strike in France is over, although the lines will not be normally working again until Monday. The other strikes voted in sympathy with the railway men proved to be merely platonic expressions except in the case of the electrical workers, whose quitting work deprived Paris of one-third of its light.

OPENING OF THE GREAT PENNSYLVANIA STATION IN NEW YORK.

On Sunday, November 27, full train service will be inaugurated by the Pennsylvania Railroad to and from its new station at Seventh Avenue and Thirty-second Street, New York City.

The location of the Pennsylvania Station, one block from Broadway, two blocks from Fifth Avenue, is in the heart of the hotel, club, and theatre district of Manhattan. Within a short radius are located the majority of the big retail stores and restaurants. The Seventh Avenue surface cars and the Eighth Avenue surface cars pass its doors; the Thirty-fourth Street surface cars (crosstown) pass its Thirty-fourth Street entrance, and stations of the Sixth Avenue Elevated and Hudson and Manhattan Tubes are a short block from its main entrance.

Time Tables showing the service to and from the Pennsylvania Station are now being arranged, and may be obtained at Ticket Offices before the opening of the Station.

Connections will be made at Manhattan Transfer (near Newark) with local trains to and from the downtown stations by way of Jersey City, so that downtown New York passengers who desire may continue to use the Cortlandt and Desbrosses Street Stations and the Hudson Terminal Station of the Hudson and Manhattan Tubes.
