TOWNS ARE WRECKED

Earthquakes Kill 300 People on Taal Island.

Four-Foot Tidal Wave Followed the Sinking of Taal Island and Swept Over a Deserted Area For a Mile Inland, Destroying All the Crops. Trees Are Breaking From Weight of Mud From Volcano—Manila Covered With Shower of Ashes.

Manila, Jan. 31.—The scientific observers sent to watch the eruption of the volcano Taal report that at 2 o'clock yesterday morning there were several violent, spectacular eruptions. At the same time there were two prolonged, strong earthquake shocks. Taal Island on which the volcano is situated, sank five feet. Then for a quarter of an hour there was a shower of mud, and this followed by a shower of ashes, which lasted half an hour. The bottom became terrorized and refused to embark on the lake. Ocean steamships arriving at Manila are covered with ashes.

Terrific Electrical Storm.
The constabulary reports that a terrific electric storm with aerial explosions prostrated half the dwellings along the lake shores. Trees are breaking with the weight of the mud from the volcano. The military forces are assisting the natives in removing their belongings from half destroyed homes. The town of Talisay is submerged and the crops have been ruined in the vicinity of the lake.

An American teacher telephones that the inhabitants of Tanauan are fleeing to the hills. Mud and stones fell at Calamba, which is 25 miles away from the volcano, and showers of ashes fell on ships at a distance of 20 miles.

A private of the Eleventh United States cavalry was killed by a falling house on the lake shore.

A four-foot tidal wave followed the sinking of Taal island and swept over a deserted area for a mile inland, destroying all the crops. The huts near by are shaking constantly and several have fallen. Houses and huts in the towns of Taal, Lemery and Tanauan have been badly damaged by falling stones.

Yesterday's eruption caused much excitement in Manila. Many persons were awakened
