NEWSY PARAGRAPHS

Summary of the Week's News of the World.

Happenings From All Parts of the Globe Put into Shape For Easy Reading—What All the World is Talking About—Cream of the News Cut from Long Dispatches.

Wednesday. President Taft spoke in advocacy of reciprocity before the Pan-American Commercial conference in Washington.

It was announced at Boston that the torpedo boat destroyer Trippe, in a private trial, had developed a speed of 33 knots.

Three sentinels were killed by a series of explosions in Managua; the family of the Nicaraguan president was escorted to the American consulate, and martial law was proclaimed.

Reports from Marfa said that the Mexican federal troops lost 40 in killed and wounded, and the rebels lost one killed and one wounded in the two days' battle at Mula on Feb 7 and 8.

Thursday. Because of mysterious circumstances attending the death of Commander Frank Marble, in the naval hospital at Newport, R. I., an inquest has been ordered.

Fighting with heavy losses on both sides, lasting four days, occurred recently in Albania, according to Ricciotti Garibaldi, who is organizing an expedition against the Turks.

The Goulds were reported to have lost the support of John D. Rockefeller in the fight which Kuhn, Loeb & Co. are said to be making to wrest control of the Missouri Pacific from them.

The case of Savarkar, the Indian student, charged with sedition, who escaped from Marseilles, while being taken from England to India, was opened in The Hague court of arbitration.

Friday. General Navarro has placed Juarez under martial law. Sixteen girls, pinned in an elevator for two hours, were rescued by policemen and firemen, who chopped a hole in the roof of the car in New York.

George J. Gould put an end to the controversy over control of the Missouri Pacific with a statement that he would retire as president of the road.

With bankbooks showing \$18,000 deposits in her possession, Mrs. Cleveland, wife of a theatrical manager, was arrested on the charge of shoplifting in New York.

Edward Popper, New York broker for J. R. Keene, denied the statements made by the Loves that Keene had ordered the sales that caused the Hocking pool to collapse.

Saturday. Emperor William had so far recovered from his attack of influenza as to be able to take an automobile ride.

It was learned that the Hon. "Bob" Belford beat Anthony J. Drexel in three rounds in a boxing bout at Lakewood, N. Y.

The senate finance committee at Albany favorably reported the nomination of Winfield A. Huppuch to be public service commissioner, second district.

It was announced that John N. Carlisle would be named by Governor Dix to investigate the public service commission, first district.

Count O'Brien de Lassy and Dr. Pantchenko were found guilty in St. Petersburg of poisoning the former's brother-in-law, Count Vassili Bouturlin; Pantchenko was recommended to mercy.

Monday. The wife of Count de Lassy, recently convicted of the murder of Count Vassili Bouturlin, has become insane.

The New York County Lawyers' association gave a dinner for Justice Hughes of the United States supreme court.

The house of commons is expected to pass the parliament bill early in May, the Unionists being unable to offer serious resistance to the measure.

FARMERS' WEEK AT CORNELL

Special Program Arranged Covering Every Hour of Day From Early Morning Until Late at Night.

Ithaca, N. Y., Feb. 21.—Farmers' week opened at the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell yesterday and more than 3,000 visitors from all parts of the state attended.

The authorities of the college have arranged a program covering every hour of the day from early morning until late at night for the whole week.

In addition to the lectures, demonstrations, exhibitions and prize contests, annual meetings will be held by the New York State Poultry Breeders' association and the New York State Drainage association.

Albany, Feb. 21.—There was no material change and no choice in yesterday's ballot for United States senator.

The 29th joint ballot resulted as follows: Democrats: Sheehan, 47; Kernan, 13; Shepard, 3; Littleton, 3; Sulzer, 3; Hopper, 2; Glynn, 1; Parker, 1; O'Brien, 1.

Republicans: Depew, 44.

Total vote cast, 118. Necessary for choice, 60.

52 BILLION EGGS IN COLD STORAGE

Also Vast Store of Butter Held For Higher Prices.

Chicago, Feb. 21.—Herbert A. Emerson, president of the United States Packing company, who is to be a witness before a subcommittee of the state senate committee on live stock and dairying this week, said:

"There are today in storage in the United States 52,000,000 pounds of surplus frozen butter taken away from the consumers throughout the last 12 months. It was held with the expectation of making the consumer pay 40 to 45 cents per pound.

"More than 50,000 cases of eggs in cold storage, which are usually consumed before this time of the year, are still unsold.

"Consumers throughout the country will be greatly pleased to know that the Butter and Egg trust, which has had such a firm grip on the throats of consumers and producers alike for the last five years, has at last met its Waterloo, and this has been brought about through the publicity given the operations of the trust by the press."

Dead Senators Eulogized.

Washington, Feb. 21.—Eulogies in honor of the late Senators John W. Daniel of Virginia and Samuel D. McEnery of Louisiana were delivered in the senate. Senator Lodge delivered an eloquent tribute to the memory of the late Virginia senator, which was greeted with applause, an unusual incident on memorial occasions in the senate.
