GIVES \$60.000 TO CORNELL

Carnegie Sends Check In Payment For

Cost of Addition to Morse Hall. Cornell university has received

from Andrew Carnegle a check for \$60,000 in payment for the cost of the new addition to Horse hall, the chemistry building at Ithaca, N. Y. which Mr. Carnegie promised to look after as a special honor to his friend, Andrew D. White, former president of the university, who is a member of the Carnegie Foundation and a trustee of the peace fund.

When the trustees decided last spring that a larger chemistry build ing was essential, Mr. Carnegie announced that he would pay for it. The addition as completed gives Cornell one of the best equipped chemistry laboratories in the country and takes care of a good many more students than could be accommodated in the old building.




