KILLED HER HUSBAND

Farmer Supposed to Have Succeeded Was Murdered.

Woman Makes Confession to the Coroner Saying She Wished to Place Her Helpmate Out of Worry—Two Days After the Murder Woman Tried to Commit Suicide—Authorities Believe Suicide Pact Existed Between the Couple.

Insisting that her act was prompted by a desire to place her husband beyond the torment which possessed him on account of impending blindness, Mrs. Frank Dorman of Bradford confessed Saturday to Coroner Herbert Smith that she had murdered him in the family home last week Tuesday night.

Dorman was a farmer and prominent in the affairs of the county and when on the day mentioned he was found with the top of his head blown off and a shotgun beside him, the community was greatly worked up.

ONCE RICH, NOW A PAUPER

Former Wife of Brodie L. Duke Dying in Illinois State Hospital.

Mrs. Alvie Webb Duke, who was formerly the wife of Brodie L. Duke, the multimillionaire tobacco man, is dying a pauper in the Illinois state hospital for the insane at Kankakee.

She was reared in a Buffalo orphan asylum and before she was 30 had established herself as a leading oil promoter of Texas.

Her connection with the tobacco industry brought about her acquaintance with Brodie L. Duke, whom she married in 1905. They were divorced later.

John Sellers, 55 years old, once a leading business man of Canastota, N. Y., strangled himself in a cell at the Canastota police station by tying a handkerchief around his neck to a post of the cot and getting down on his knees.

WRECK ON THE LEHIGH

INJURED CONVALESCING

Victims of Teachers' Excursion Wreck Gaining in Strength Daily.

Easton, Pa., May 9.—All of the victims of the wreck of the Utica, N. Y., teachers' excursion train who remain in the Easton hospital continue to improve and unless complications set in there will be no more deaths.

Prosecutor Stryker of Warren county, N. J., said that he would attend the meeting of the public utilities commission of New Jersey which opens in Philadelphia on Wednesday for the purpose of making inquiry into the wreck.

GALLINGER HONORED

Party Caucus Nominates Him as President Pro Tempore of Senate.

Washington, May 9.—The Republican senators in party caucus unanimously nominated Senator Jacob M. Gallinger of New Hampshire as president pro tempore of the senate to succeed Senator William P. Frye of Maine, who resigned on account of ill health.

Thirty-one senators were present and Senator Gallinger received every vote cast, 30. No other name was considered.
