THE assessed valuation of personal property in the State will run to more than \$200,000,000 for the fiscal year ending November 30 next, according to a tabulation at the Auditor General's Department of figures so far returned. This is an increase of more than \$67,000,000 over last year, or something more than an average increase of \$1,000,000 for each county of the State.

In the election to eliminate the prohibltion amendment from the Maine constitution the wets now claim a majority in the state of 26. If this proyes correct the probibition clause which has been a feature in the states constitution for more than thirty years, is voted out. It is just about that many years also since the Democrats had control of the state-two facts which can hardly be classed as merely inciden-

In an earnest effort to increase the number of game fish in Pennsyivania streams, Nathan R. Buller, the new Commissioner of Fisheries, will not plant any trout or bass less than yearlings. This is a policy that anglers have been long clamoring for. There was complaint that the planting of many millions of fry reexchable fish in the streams as the baby fish were too weak to survive a battle for existence in strong waters against innumerable natural enemies. There will not be any diversified work at the hatcheries, each of which is to be devoted to some special variety of fish with an aim toward the highest efficiency, according to Mr. Buller's plans.

CONGRESSMAN SPEER LENDS HAND Writes a Strong Protest Against Water Rights Monopoly.

Hon. P. M. Speer of Oil City, our able Congressman, has taken up the fight for the people against the granting of charters and turning over the water rights of Tionesta creek and Ciarion river to a monopaly and has written a powerful and most comprehensive protest against such grant on the part of the State Water Commission at Harrisburg, which we publish in full. Congressman Speer assures his people that he is with them in this fight to a finish, and holds himself in readiness to oppose this monopolistic grab at every turn. Following is his letter:

OIL CITY, PA., SEPT. 14, 1911. To the Water Supply Commission of Pennsylvania.

GENTLEMEN: -As a citizen of Western Pennsylvania, in the territory to be affected thereby, I desire earnestly to protest against the approval by your Commission of the application now pending for charters to dam, store and use for power and other purposes the waters of Tionesta creek and Ciarion river.

The effect of these charters, if their purpose can be carried out, is to grant to the incorporators an absolute monopoly of the waters of these two streams for practically all purposes; and if the project is feasible, the franchise in the end would be worth millions of dollars to its owners; this would be taking from the people the

The Commission, as I understand it, We are authorized to announce Nelson was created in pursuance of a widespread G. Cole, of Green township, as a candidate demand, recently developed, that the Treasurer, subject to the decision of natural resources of the country should be conserved for the public, and not permitted to be monopolized for the benefit of a few individuals, and that the waters of our state especially should be so conserved and kept uncontaminated so as to be suitable for public use. In furtherance of this advanced governmental idea, at the same session of the legislature which created your Commission, an act was passed taking away from water companies the right of eminent domain "as respects the appropriation of the streams, rivers, or waters of this Commonwealth, or any of them and the land governed thereby." Your Commission also must approve under the legislation creating it and subsequent legislation enlarging its powers, of all charters which in any way apply to or effect the waters of the Commonwealth. This power no doubt was given for the very purpose of enabling your Commission to aid in this work of conserving our natural resources.

Water is as much a public necessity as air and to grant to a few individuals the monopoly of the water of these two important streams, especially without any public benefit from said grant, would be an outrage upon the communities which are entitled to the use and benefit of

It would seem sufficiently clear that the intention of the legislature of 1905 was to prevent any such a monopoly by tak-Burhenn, of Green township, as a candidate for County Commissioner, subject to

Personally I am of the opinion that no Bortzer, of Jenks township, as a candidate for County Commissioner, subject to the decision of the Republican voters at the incorporators to accomplish what they desire, but if it were believed they could do so then the capitalization is entirely inadequate, and to grant charters of this character is a violation of the rule which has been adopted in this Commonwealth of requiring those applying for a charter to show a capitalization fairly sufficient for the purposes for which the incorporation is made. If these charters when granted are valid and if the project is feasible it gives to these incorporators a a most valuable franchise which they have thus acquired for practically nothing and which they can exploit to their own financial advantage by turning these valuable franchises over to persons who may have and are willing to furnish the money to do the work. The Commonwealth should not grant valuable franchises for that purpose and therefore in all cases of this character the capitalization should be ample for the purposes of charters. I believe it would be the clear duty of the Commission to take into consideration all phases of the question and especially the rights of the citizens in the ocalities of these streams and entitled to advantages thereof; and since our legislation appears to have been intended to prevent such a monopolization of our streams, it should not be permitted by the Commission even if by some legal technicality the right to grant such charters may exist. Such grant is clearly antagonistic to the intent if not the wording of our statutes and, as I believe, a violation of the common law rights of the Respectfully yours,
