A LARGE DEAL IN TIMBER LANDS.

-George T. Watts, of New York City, L. S. Clough & Co. Dispose of All Their Holdings in Forest County to T. D. Collins, Frank X. Kreitler and Frank K. Brown.

All the land involved in this gigantic transfer of property lies in the townships night to witness the Hallowe'en doings of Howe and Jenks, but very little merchantable timber remains on the Jenks township t-acts. The warrant numbers and the acreage of each are as follows: 5101, 1374 acres, Howe; 5104, 1362 acres, Howe; 5103, 551 acres, Howe; 5282, 1218 acres, Howe; 3183, 532 acres, Howe; 5106, 1176 acres. Howe and Jenks: 5107, 1174 seres. Howe and Jenks; 5136, 80 acres, Jenks, making in all 7467 acres. The best timber remains on tracts 5101, 5104 and 5282, which lie just east of Tionest creek in the vicinity of Mayburg and Balltown, A conservative estimate places the timber on all the tracts at 40,000,000 feet, the principal part of which is hemlock, with the balance made up of all kinds of hardwood. This deal means a new lease of life for Mayburg, as the timber will no doubt be manufactured into lumber there, and the Watson Lands company were nearing the end of their operations. It is rumored that the new owners may also establish a chemical plant at some point along the creek to make use of the hardwood. The above deal settles litigation of about six years' duration over the title of part of the property, the points in dispute being the vestern boundary lines of warrants 5101 and 5104,

This deal also marks the passing of firm which had a long and honorable business career in Forest county-L. S. Clough & Co. For many years they operated large lumbering plants at Clough's Mills, first in Jenks township and later in Howe township, and they cut off practically all of the merchantable timber standing on the eastern slopes of the above mentioned tracts. They also owned a nine-mile spur of railroad connecting their plant with the P. & W., now the B. & O. railroad, at McCray's Siding, The present members of the firm are L S.
