A nice tract of 10 or 12 acres of red and white oak was burnt, because it was too heavy to float to points where it could be manufactured, 15 feet butts were left in cutting white pine, and fully 50 per cent, of the tree was lost, the stumps being cut breast high. The Parcels Post Law.

The plan briefly stated, is that fourth class mail matter shall embrace all artides including farm and factory products now not included in first, second and third class, and not exceeding II pounds in weight, nor in size 72 inches in length and girth combined. 
