ONE Wilson tariff bill put the country on the bum in short order. What will the still worse one coming on do to it, even under the present great prosperity wave?

GOVERNOR TENER has signed the bill requiring ten verses from the Scriptures to be read without comment at the opening of each public school session, and the bill is now a law. Teachers who refuse to obey the law are subject to dismissal if charges are preferred and substantiated.

THE first "get together" assemblage of the Republican party since the Democratic landslide last November convened in Washington Sunday, when the Executive committee of the Republican National committee met in the New Willard to diagnose and prescribe a cure for party allments. The utmost harmony and cordiality prevailed throughout the conference, at which more than half the States were represented by Progressive and Republican Senators, Congressmen, national committeemen and citizens of prominence in industrial pursuits. It was determined to make an early call for a national convention to further discuss plans for the next congressional campaign.

#### State Park Bill Defeated.

The bill for the purchase by the State of the Cook lands in Forest, Clarion and Jefferson counties was defeated in the House at Harrisburg Monday night. The tract comprises 7,219 acres, and is the only large body of native or virgin pine that could be purchased in Pennsylvania. The bill carried an appropriation of \$635,000, which represen a the value placed upon the land and timber by the State's own cruisers. The debate over the bill lasted more than two hours and it was attacked because of reservations. made by the owners of the property and the value estimated was challenged. In defense of the bill several members declared that it was the last remaining white pine in the country and the property was important for conservation as well as scenic purposes. The bill received 64 votes in its favor, 71 being cast against

Thus has the State legislature thrown away its last chance of securing what would make one of the most beautiful public parks in the United States. Before the meeting of another legislature vast changes will have taken place on this magnificent property.


