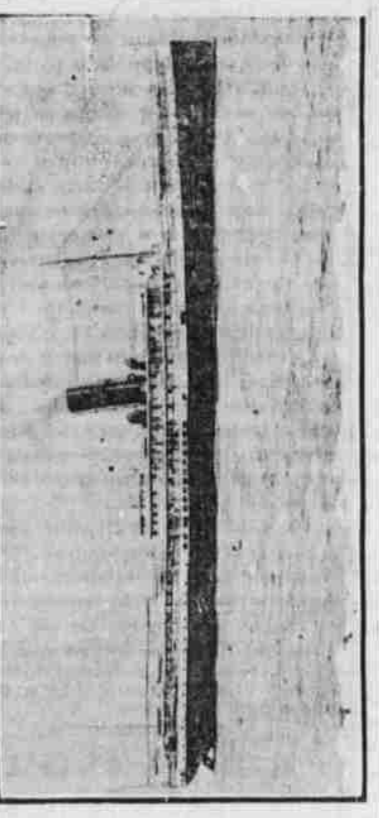

EXPLANATION IS FURNISHED

Gompers at Miners' Convention Defends Federation

RESENTS FLINGS FIRED AT HIM

An Assessment For Copper Mine Strikers in Michigan Would Have Wrecked Federation, Says President. In response to the request of the United Mineworkers that he appear before them and explain the alleged sympathy of the American Federation of Labor in connection with the copper miners' strike in Michigan Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, addressed the convention.

Mr. Gompers denied that he maintained a machine to keep himself in office and, as an illustration, said he had two offers of positions from the governor of a great state, one paying \$3,000 a year and the other \$10,000, but had refused both to continue in the labor movement.

Mr. Gompers challenged any man to show he had not done his work thoroughly. He asked the delegates to read the report on the development of industrial unionism and said that every encouragement for amalgamation had been given by the federation.

SAY "PLOT" WAS FRAMEUP. Huerta's Way to Get Rid of Enemies, It is Claimed. Two Felicitas, Fidoio Hernandez, who was secretary to General Felix Diaz, and Guillermo Meljoure, both members of the house of representatives from Oaxaca and who were arrested in Mexico City when President Huerta dissolved congress but were later released, were arrested on a charge of being implicated in the plot for an uprising on Feb. 12.

ORDERS SALE OF WABASH. Judge Adams in St. Louis Authorizes Foreclosure. Because the Wabash railroad receivers were unable to take advantage of a legal opportunity to save the road from foreclosure by paying the defaulted interest, aggregating more than \$4,000,000, the sale of the system was authorized by Judge Elmer B. Adams in the United States circuit court in St. Louis.

CULLUM LEFT \$100,000. Ex-Governor Beaver Passes Away. General James Adams Beaver, aged seventy-six, justice of the superior court and former governor of Pennsylvania, died in his home in Bellefonte from arterio sclerosis. General Beaver's death is the last of Bellefonte's trio of governors, Curtin, Beaver and Hastings.

Robbers Attack Postoffice Safe. The postoffice at DuBois, near Johnstown, Pa., was burglarized and about \$50 in cash and \$100 in stamps taken from the safe.
