**WAR PARAGRAPHS**

M. Denys Cochin presented 250 Greeks to the French minister of war for service in the foreign legion. They are all Balkan veterans.

The Belgian correspondent of the Journal telegraphs that wounded officers of the German army who have been captured say that the Kaiser has ordered that all war correspondents who fall into the hands of the Germans be shot without trial.

Naval reservists have begun to do police duty in Paris. There are only about 150 arrests a night, which is the normal number.

The French ministers of war and interior have instructed the departmental prefects to keep a precise account of all German atrocities reported, the evidence to be carefully and systematically corroborated.

The Belgian army has retreated to Antwerp, which, with its strong defenses, may be counted upon to resist the Germans indefinitely. German troops have also occupied the Belgian cities of Brussels, Ghent and Ostend.

The correspondent at Brussels of the Figaro telegraphs that he knows from personal knowledge that General Leman, the commander at Liege, has sworn to blow up the forts rather than surrender them to the Germans.

News agency dispatches from Rome

and St. Petersburg say the Russian advance guard has penetrated into northern Bukovina and is marching on Caernowitz.

M. Caillaux, former minister of finance, who was a sergeant in the reserves when he joined his regiment at the outbreak of war, has been promoted to the rank of sub-lieutenant.

The French cabinet met to discuss the possibility of relaxing the moratorium declared soon after the beginning of the war.

During the past twenty-four hours 97,000 soldiers have joined General Kitchener's army.

The Copenhagen correspondent of the London Daily Express says the German dirigible Zeppelin II. crossed Denmark flying northward.

A dispatch to the London Daily Chronicle says the Germans have evacuated Saarburg, in lower Alsace.

Grand Duke Michael, the czar's brother, left London to join his regiment. He is thirty-six years of age.

Four German girls were arrested at Brussels on the charge of spying. Three spies, one a woman, have been shot.

The Prince of Wales national relief fund reached a total of \$7,500,000.

A telegram to the London Star from its Rotterdam correspondent says that Germany has imposed a war levy of 50,000,000 francs upon the city of Liege.

A GENERAL SURVEY OF THE WAR

The retirement of the allied armies from Belgium and the realignment of their forces on French soil marked the beginning of the week. This was done after a three days' battle in which the Germans had succeeded in breaking through the line of the allies. The French line in the neighborhood of Luneville broke, and the Germans occupied that town and several others in that vicinity. They claim that they captured 150 cannon and many prisoners.

During the week the campaign in Alsace-Lorraine, where the French have taken the offensive, ebbed and flowed, the French claiming to have made consistent progress toward Strassburg, while the Germans claim a victory at Metz. The censorship does not permit any knowledge of the number of men engaged, here or elsewhere, to become known, hence only a general notion of the situation is available.

Judging from the slow but sure progress the Germans have made through Belgium it is to be assumed that the Germans, commanded by the Kaiser himself, have several millions of men on the battle line. This is so many more than have ever before engaged in a similar conflict that no comparison is possible. It is known, however, that the Kaiser has massed his whole strength on the French frontier for a decisive blow and if it falls the German cause will be in a bad way, because the Russian army of several millions of men is at the back door of Germany, if not already well on its way toward Berlin. Austria is also being invaded. On the north she faces the Russians and on the south the Servians and Montenegrins have achieved a series of successes, the latest of which is said to have been the repulse of the Austrian army of 110,000 men with a loss of 25,000 killed, wounded and prisoners, and 40 or 50 cannon and great quantities of munitions and supplies.

When Russia began to threaten Austria from the north Austria withdrew her regular army from the Serbian frontier and replaced it with reservists, sending the regulars to oppose the Russian invasion. It is these reservists who have been defeated and if their defeat is as complete as represented it would appear that Austria is open to attack from the south by any one of her numerous enemies. The Servians and Montenegrins will doubtless press home their advantage, and if Italy should join in the struggle against the German-Austrian coalition, as seems possible, she will probably take advantage of the opportunity to seize additional territory along the Adriatic.

The ultimatum served upon Germany by Japan a week ago has expired and as Germany has made no reply Japan is doubtless moving already to enforce her demand for the elimination of German influence in the Far East. Her first task will be the reduction of the German fortifications at Kiauchau.

France and England have decided to advance 500,000,000 francs to Belgium, half of the amount to be furnished by each of the two countries.

The United States senate passed the emergency war risk marine insurance bill after only two hours debate. The bill carries an appropriation of \$5,000,000 to insure American vessels and their cargoes against loss by war.

Austria has called for every male between the ages of nineteen and sixty to enter the army immediately. Austria has 3,000,000 men not littered to called to the front.

M'REYNOLDS NOMINATED

President Promotes Attorney General to Supreme Court Bench.  
President Wilson has nominated Attorney General James C. McReynolds to the United States supreme court to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Lurton and at the same time named Thomas W. Gregory of Austin, Tex., assistant to the attorney general, to succeed McReynolds at the head of the department of justice.

Thomas W. Gregory of Austin, Tex., the special assistant of the attorney general, who is slated to succeed McReynolds, is now in charge of the New Haven case. Gregory is fifty-three years of age, a native of Mississippi and has been prominently identified with Texas bar activities. He is said to have the backing of Colonel E. M. House of Texas, reputed "political mentor" of the president.

Roller Fatally Crushed.

Joseph Miller, aged thirty-nine, of Homestead, Pa., died in the West Penn hospital from injuries received in the Carnegie mills in Homestead. Miller, a roller, was working at his roll when his sleeve caught in the rolls. His arm was torn from his body and he was bruised and crushed before fellow workmen shut off the power.

TORNADO AT WILKES-BARRE

Six Killed and Half Million Dollars in Property Damage.  
Six persons are dead, about fifty injured, fifty houses razed and other damage done in the heights section of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., and Blackman section of Wilkes-Barre township as a result of a cyclone. The property damage will exceed \$500,000.  
McFarlane's silk throwing mill was unroofed, the walls toppled over and several of the girl employes were injured. The Hillside Congregational church was moved off its foundation.  
The coming of the cyclone was not foreshadowed by any wind, the whirlwind seeming to drop suddenly out of the heavens and to ascend just as suddenly after working destruction over a limited area.  
A committee organized three hours after the cyclone to afford relief to victims.
