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Fractured Skull Causes Death.

Thomas Bloomer, who was employed about the Wheeler & Dusenbury lumbering plant at Endeavor, met with an accident Friday afternoon which resulted in his death some hours afterward. He was engaged in cleaning up about the new mill, and while near a window or opening where refuse edgings and slabs are thrown out, a distance of about 18 feet to the ground, it is thought that he was struck on the head by a piece of wood that had been thrown out of the window. The blow fractured his skull and rendered him unconscious, in which condition he was found a short time afterward. Drs. Morrow and Lafferty of West Hickory, and Robertson of Warren were summoned, but the unfortunate man died shortly after their arrival.

Mr. Bloomer was aged 68 years, having been born in Philadelphia, March 5, 1846. He had been for many years a resident of Limestone township, Warren county, where the burial took place Sunday. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. J. E. Carpenter, of near Townsville, Crawford county.
