Court of Quarter Sessions,  
Judges Snowden and Porter,  
Monday, Jan. 22d.

After the Court was organized, Judge Snowden rose and announced the death of Benjamin Patton, Sr., the father of the President Judge of the Court. He read a letter from Judge Patton to the members of the bar to the effect that many of the cases on the Civil docket could with justice to their interests be disposed of by the Court until the third Monday in February, to which time the jury, except those empanelled in the Denniston case, were discharged. The parties in the cases were discharged until the same date.

DEATH OF BENJAMIN PATTON, SR.—Mr. Forward made a motion to adjourn the Court until 3 o'clock, as a mark of respectful feeling, upon the announcement of the death of the father of the President Judge of this Court, and in order to give the Bench and Bar an opportunity to hold a meeting to express their sentiments upon the occurrence of this painful event, in such a manner as might seem proper.

MEETING OF THE BAR, UPON THE DEATH OF BENJ. PATTON, SR.—On the motion of Walter Forward, Esq., the Court in Session adjourned, and at a meeting of the Bench and Bar of the county of Allegheny, called on the occasion of the death of Benj. Patton, Sr., father of the President of the Common Pleas. The Hon. John M. Snowden was called to the Chair, and Hon. William Porter appointed Vice President, and James G. Reed, Esq., Secretary.

Mr. Dunlop on presenting the following resolutions, said that it was a great task on this melancholy occasion, to bear testimony to the truth of the sentiments expressed in them.—He had known Mr. Patton from an early youth, his acquaintance with him commencing with his school-boy days in the town of Belfonte. That deceased had ever borne the reputation of a blameless life and honorable character. That he was a man of the most affectionate and the most charitable sentiments, and had endeared himself to his numerous friends and acquaintances by his uniform urbanity. He secured the favorable opinion of every one who had become intimate with him to know him well enough to appreciate his worth.

Resolved, That the Bench and Bar of Allegheny county deplore the death of Benjamin Patton, Esq., the father of the President of this Court, and tender the presiding officer our sincere condolence at the lamentable event which deprived him of an honored and affectionate parent and society of a man respected for his blameless reputation and numerous virtues.

Resolved, That the presiding officers of this meeting present in writing to the Honorable the President, the condolence of his brethren of the Bench and Bar.

Resolved, That the Court be requested to order these proceedings to be entered by the Clerk of the Common Pleas on the Records of this Court.

Progress of Mormonism.  
FLOURISHING CONDITION OF NAUVOO.—The "Times and Seasons" give a monthly account of the spiritual and temporal progress of the Latter Day Saints. The last publication says:—"The work is still progressing in Canada, New Brunswick, England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and in the Isle of Man, and in despite of the vast numbers that are constantly emigrating to this land, their numbers are continually on the increase. In Wales, native elders have been ordained, who are going forth and preaching in their own language the great principles of eternal truth. We have elders preaching in New Holland and in the East Indies, and elders during the past year have been sent to islands in the South Sea. Elders Hyde and Adams are also preparing to go on a mission to Russia in the Spring." So also in their temporal prosperity and progress. The city of Nauvoo is increasing in the number of well built houses, and merchants are settling among them. Their municipal regulations have been revised, a large police force organized, to guard against the encroachments of blacklegs, horse thieves, kidnappers, and other scoundrels, who so much infest the river; the wharves have been improved, to facilitate the landing of steamboats, and a dam across one of the channels of the Mississippi commenced, which will make it one of the finest harbors on the river; and be useful for manufacturing purposes, which branch of business, it seems, is about to be embarked in.—The paper alluded to says:

"Many branches of mechanism are going on; brickmakers, carpenters, bricklayers, masons, plasterers, blacksmiths, and many other branches of business have found abundance of employ. There is, however, one thing we would respectfully call the attention of our brethren to, that is, the business of manufacturing. There is, perhaps, no place in the western country, where cotton, woollen, silk, iron and earthenware could be manufactured to better advantage than they could in Nauvoo. There is not a branch in any of the above trades, from making the machinery to completing the most delicate fabrics or wares, but what we have artisans or mechanics that are fully competent to the task, having followed those several branches of manufactures, either in the eastern States or in the old world; and when the above named dam shall be erected, it will afford greater facilities for manufacturing purposes, and better prospects for capitalists to invest their money, than anything that has come under our notice for a long time."

From this account it will be seen that, notwithstanding the abuse of this sect, and the characterizing Joe Smith and his followers as fools, they still know how to conduct their affairs with prudence and intelligence, and in this respect may set an example to many deformed much wiser.

Tennessee Legislature—A Scene.  
A dignified scene of legislation took place in the Tennessee House of Delegates, on the 17th inst. Mr. Miller made a speech, charging the Whigs with wasting the time of the House.—As he concluded, there was some whistling and hissing heard from the Whig side of the House. Mr. M. noticed that the junior member from Davidson had hissed or whistled at his remarks, and regarding it as a personal insult, he walked deliberately over to Mr. T. and expressed himself in severe personal terms. Mr. T. raised a chair, and Mr. M. pressed in upon him—a general melee of the members ensued, and the parties were only kept separated by the exertions of gentlemen of both parties. Mr. T. obtained the floor, and made an explanation in reply to the allusions of Mr. Miller, and stated that he whistled to give expression merely to his surprise at the remarks of Mr. M., and that he had no intention to insult the gentleman from Hardeman; and that in resenting the language used by Mr. M., as he had done, he had acted as every gentleman would have done under the circumstances.

Sunday at New Orleans.  
It would shock some of our good folks in this quarter to see Sunday celebrated as it sometimes is in New Orleans.—We see that recently a grand review of the military by the Governor took place on Sunday, when about 5000 troops turned out—cavalry, artillery and infantry. In addition to the military volunteers, which evinced much discipline, the races attracted the attention of thousands of strangers. Full bumpers of egg nog, &c., were served up gratuitously at various hotels in the evening, and three theatres and two masquerade balls were in full operation. This is worse than the running of the Sunday mails.

A RICH GOLD MINE.—The Salisbury (N. C.) Watchman says that the Rowan gold mine, near Gettysburg, is the richest that has ever been discovered in the United States. It is described as a small vein, from four to twelve inches wide. A quantity of the ore taken from it has yielded \$200 to the bushel, and some as much as \$500 to the bushel. It is said that 11,876 pennyweights had been taken from it about a month since by seven hands.

THE WIDOW OF LACHNER.—The widow of the German who stole the Pomeroy Express Trunk, and afterwards committed suicide, was released from the N. Y. prison and sent home on Monday morning, where she was informed of her husband's fate. She received it with paroxysms of distress, but through the aid and advice of a German minister, was finally restored to a proper sense of her situation. From her previous threats, it was feared that she would be prompted to commit suicide, but the consolatory advice of the minister produced a promise not to resort to any means to destroy herself.—She refused to be taken to see the body of her husband, whom she now considers as the sole author of her bitter misfortune. She is a fine looking woman of about twenty-two years of age, of German parentage, and had been acquainted with Lachner but a short time before the marriage.—Times.

SENTENCE FOR MANSLAUGHTER.—Peter Williams, a volunteer fireman in New York, who killed D. B. Stanley in a fight at a fire, has been sentenced by the Court to imprisonment at hard labor in the State Prison at Mount Pleasant (Sing Sing) for twenty-one years and six months. The prisoner, after the sentence, laughed and said, with a tremendous oath, that he thought they would give it to him.

NEW SPECIES OF TAXATION.—Gov. Tucker, of Mississippi, in his message to the Legislature of that State, recommends that a tax be laid upon colored babies.
