

Correspondence from Harrisburg.

HARRISBURG, FEBRUARY 14, 1844.

On Friday last, pending the subject of a sale of the public works in the Senate, Mr. Sullivan presented the following resolution, which was adopted.

Resolved, That the committee on Finance and Internal Improvement to whom was referred so much of the Governor's Message as related to the sale of the main line and Delaware Division of the public works, be instructed to report bills for the sale of the said public works.

A communication was received from the Canal Commissioners urging upon the legislature the early appropriation of \$60,000 for repairing the damaged lines of the state improvements so as to have them in readiness for the opening of the spring navigation; and Saturday Mr. Taber of the House, from the committee on Internal Improvements reported a bill appropriating \$60,000 for that purpose.

A bill has been reported in the Senate proposing for the election of prosecuting attorneys, Mr. Cooper's resolutions relative to a sale of the public works, and a distribution of the proceeds arising from a sale of the public lands, according to the scheme of Wm. Cost Johnson have been the subject of much discussion in the Senate.

A resolution was offered the other day by Mr. Ambrose to reduce the pay of members of the legislature to \$2 per day. The proposition was met with but little favor and was indefinitely postponed. The committee on the salary in the House has been instructed to inquire into the expediency of bringing in a bill to reduce all the salaries of the officers of the government, including the Governor's, Canal Commissioners, members of the Legislature

Mr. Wilcox, on Monday, presented a memorandum from Sidney Rigdon, Post-master at Nauvoo, (Ill.) and a member of the church of Latter Day Saints, praying the legislature Pennsylvania to interfere in behalf of the persons by instructing the Pennsylvania delegation in Congress to use their exertions in opposing about such measures as will protect them from persecution, and cause a redress of wrongs, and of the wrong of his brethren—murders, rapine, plunder, violence and cruelty which they suffered at the hands of the people of Missouri, in their exterminating warfare against them.

During the past week the legislature has been engaged mostly in the consideration of private and a comparative calm has pervaded these sessions. The question of the public printing will again before long, and then for more words, words. Mr. Sullivan, from the committee on printing, to which the subject was referred, has reported a bill directing suits to be brought against all such public printers and persons who may have wrongfully or erroneously printed any sum or sums of money from the treasury for printing and binding.

On Monday morning, the committee was instructed to inquire into the expediency of exempting the property of women from being taken in execution for the debts of their husbands. Putz.

Mr. Wain and Johnson Meeting. A glorious victory will be the certain result of union and harmony with the democratic party.

Resolved, That the delegates from this county and senatorial district in the 4th March convention be and are hereby instructed to vote for Martin Van Buren for President and Richard M. Johnson for Vice President of the U. S.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be signed by the officers and published in the democratic papers of this state, and in the Washington Globe, and that a copy be forwarded to Martin Van Buren and Richard M. Johnson.
