

in which the state has no in- creased and would increase the revenues \$5,000 to 100,000 dollars, which for want of this outlet, is reduced to \$15,000; and will be lost al- together to the state, should the exten- sion of the Delaware and Raritan canal be completed. For the moment this extension is finished, all the coal which passes through the state canal, will necessarily, effectually transferred to the New Jersey canal opposite Easton. But the construction of the outlet would obviate the necessity of the pro- posed extension, provided the authority, which is given before any final ac- tion by the New Jersey Legislature, is secured to the state some re- vention from the coal trade—for her improvements, the profits, on these companies, to whom in- terests should not be done, but with- out relative positions, it is true, a great extent be changed; the effect would simply be, that the coal which will be deposited at Philadelphia, and shipped coast-wise— from the Lehigh and Wyoming fields would pass directly through the state canal to New York. The whole question then, so far as it is concerned, is, whether the state, by the construction of an outlet to the Black's Eddy, shall secure from 100,000 to 100,000 dollars revenue; or, the \$15,000 which she now gets from the construction of the proposed extension. I would observe that I have no per- sonal interest whatever in the subject, and from the good of my native state, I should be pleased if you would call attention of the Legislature to it.
