# HORSES---DIRECTIONS TO PURCHA SERS.

Of course every man wishes for a sound horse, without defect in wind, limb or sight. The various imperfections which occur in each of these are here enumerated:

THE EYES .- When the animal about to be purchased is at the stable door. before he is brought out, examine his eyes; the light coming upon them in that situation, will enable you to discover any defect that may exist. Remember that both eyes must be in an equal degree of light; and regarding this, observe that there is no difference in the eyes, for if they be not alike one must be diseased. If both eves be clear and hazel round the pupil, and the pupil itself be blue and free from any white specks-if it contract in the light and dilate when in the shade you may conclude the eyes are good. 
