At this period in the season, when farmers and others are putting down their winter's, and we may add, their next year's meat, it may be of service to re-publish the following receipt: To one gallon of MARKET STREET, water take one and a half pound of salt, a half pound of brown sugar, a half ounce of saltpetre, and a half ounce of potash. In this ratio the pickle to be increased to any quantity desired. Let these be boiled tegether until all the dirt from the salt and sugar rises to the top and is skimmed off. Then throw the pickle into a large tub to cool, and when cold, pour it over your beef or pork, to remain the usual time, say from four to six weeks, according to the size of the pieces, and the kind of meat. The meat must be well covered with the pickle, and it should not be put down for at least two days after the kill-ing, during which time it should be slight-Sept. 11, 1861. ly sprinkled with saltpetre. The above is recommended as an old and oft tried reeeipt for curing meat, and one which has always given satisfaction.
