TRAUD TO BE PUNISHABLE WITH DEATH. The Committee on the conduct of the war have resolved to advise the immediate passage of a bill to punish with death any person who commits a fraud upon the Government, whereby a soldier is bodily injured, as for instance in the sale of unsound provisions. Also, to punish with imprisonment and confiscation of all property and Government dues all contractors who in any way defraud the Government in the qualities of goods sold or services pretended to be rendered to the Government.

A CONTRACT TO BE ANNULLED. It is understood that the contracts let out by Secretary Cameron, for over a million Springfield muskets, and over a quarter of a million rifles and carbines, will be ordered to be annulled by Congress. They will not be available in the present war, and as they are to cost an average of seven dollars each above the manufacturer's prices, they involve a loss of nearly nine million dollars to the Treasury.

SECRETARY CAMERON'S REPLY. General Cameron, in replying to the resolution of the Senate calling for information relative to army contracts and payment of troops, says: "I take occasion to state that I myself have not made a single contract for any purpose whatever, having always interpreted the laws of Congress as contemplating that the heads of bureaus, who are experienced and able officers of the regular army, shall make all contracts for supplies for the branches of the service under their charge respectively."

The Anacosta Coils Again. The New York Times publishes, as from the "highest authority," a letter dated at Washington, from which we take the following extract: "I write warmly about Gen. McClellan, because I know and love the man. Your suggestion to attack Manassas, even at the risk of defeat, on the ground that we had better be beaten than not to pieces, is not like your usual good sense. Any military man would tell you that to hurl our forces against those strong entrenchments would be sheer madness. But Gen. McClellan has them caught in their own trap. They are like a fox in a burrow with one hole, where they must soon be forced out, and then Gen. McClellan will fall upon them like a thunderbolt. The public will not then complain of his want of energy. I tell you it will be so fearful as to have waiting and mourning go up from every Southern household. Knowing what I do, and having thus but barely hinted at the grand plan of the campaign, I repeat that the rebels are doomed, and Seceession will never again raise its head in the land. The folds of the giant constrictor are now tightening around the rebellion, and the coming month will see it crushed out completely and forever. Again I say, look out for 'short war and a desperate one.'"

Another Financial Scheme. The refusal of the Committee of Ways and Means to sanction the financial scheme of Mr. Chase and the Bank Presidents, has led to the presentation of a new plan, which it is said can pass Congress: 1. An issue of demand notes to meet the wants of the people for currency, not to exceed three hundred millions, receivable for Government dues, and convertible into six per cent. bonds. 2. An issue of sixty per cent. Bonds, payable in twenty years—all other Bonds convertible into these, so as to have but one form of funded securities. 3. A revenue bill to raise by excise and impost duties two hundred millions of dollars. 4. Specie to be received by Government on deposit, and certificates issued therefore, payable at any of the Government depositories in the country. 5. Registered bank notes to be issued for circulation to corporations or individuals, on pledge of Government stocks. 6. No direct taxation, if there is a reasonable assurance of two millions of revenue without it.
