I have nothing of the kind to say, for I have never acknowledged such sentiments .-However violently I may have been stricken, I have never found men more blind or ungrateful, or my political destiny more harsh than I expected. It has given alternately, and in great abundance, its joys and secrows; such is the law of humanity But it has been in the happiest days, and in the most brilliant successes of my career, that I found the insufficiency of public life.

The political world is cold and calculating; the affairs of government are lofty, and powerfully impress the Dress Goods, thoughts; but they cannot fill the soul, which has often more varied and more pressing aspirations than those of the most ambitious politician. It longs for a happiness more intimate, more complete and more tender than that which all the labors and triumphs of active exertion and public importance can bestow. 


