Nov. 16, 1862.—The President, Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy, desires and enjoins the orderly observance of the Sabbath by the officers and men in the military and naval service. The importance of man and beast of the prescribed weekly rest, the sacred rights of Christian soldiers and sailors, a becoming deference te the best sentiment of a Christian people, and a due regard for the Divine will, demand 59 MARKET ST., PITTSBURGH, PA. that Sunday labor in the army and navy be reduced to this measure of strict necessity. The discipline and character of the national forces should not suffer, nor the cause defended be imperilled by the profanation of the day and name of the Most High. At this time of public distress, adopting the words of George Washington, in 1776, men may and enough to do in the service of God, and their country without abandoning themselves to vice and immorality. The first general order issued by the Father of his Country after the Declaration of Independ ence indicate the spirit in which our institutions were founded, and should ever be defended. The General hopes and trusts that every officer and man will endeavor and act as becomes Christian soldier, defending the dearest rights and liberties of his country.
