A ream of 480 sheets costs from \$9 to \$10. and returns to the publisher, at a cent and a half a sheet, after being printed, \$7 20. On the cost of white paper alone, therefore, there is a loss of over \$4 on every thousand printed. Add to this the cost of news, composition, machinery for printing, reportorial and editorial wages, tax on advertisements, tax on gross receipts, and the amount of profit on newspaper publishing at the present time is not so great as to present a very tempting inducement for people entering into such en-
