

**A Live Crab in a Child's Stomach.**

The last number of the Lycoming Gazette contains the following account of a singular case: A child of Mr. Wheeland, residing in the lower end of this borough, eighteen months of age, was the subject of violent pain in the stomach, unless under the effect of narcotics, attended with increasing debility and wasting away of the system. Several physicians had been in attendance who pronounced it nothing more than severe cholera, and prescribed accordingly, but without producing any permanent effect. Miss Young, M. D., was ultimately applied to. On a thorough examination of the body, and pressing her hand upon the stomach, she felt something move, and became satisfied some living creature was there, and to remove it applied appropriate remedies. These had the desired effect. A crab, one inch and a half in length, with sixteen legs, claws very sharp and covered with scales, was the result. Some life still remained. From that time the child recovered, and became perfectly healthy. The supposition is that the egg was swallowed, or the creature when very small. In the stomach of so young a child the egg would hatch, which would not be the case with one more advanced in life. Miss Young has the crab in a state of preservation. Thus the life of this child was saved by the skill of this lady, whose reputation as a successful practitioner is fully established in this community, by the restoration of persons afflicted with intricate and dangerous complaints.
