Thousands of acres of soil are annually planted in flowers in France and Italy, for perfume alone. A single grower in Southern France sells annually 60,000 pounds rose flowers, 30,-900 pounds each of jasamine and turberose, 40,000 pounds of violet blossoms, besides thousands of pounds of mint, thyme, rosemary, &c., and he is but one of hundreds engaged in this branch of horticulture. The atmosphere of some of these towns is so filled with fragrance that a person is made aware of his approach to them by the odors which greet him miles away. Already in America hundreds of acres of peppermint and lavender are being planted and product exported to Europe. Though the Old World bears the palm in the perfumary line, and London and Paris, with their Convent Gardens and Marcheaux Flurs, lead New York in window gardening and the cultivation of flowers in pots generally, yet New York carries on a larger trade in cut flowers than either of the cities mentioned or any other in the world. One New York dealer has sold since last September 50,000 carnation blossoms, 60,000 bouvardias, 70,000 Chinese primroses, 30,000 turberoses, besides over 10,000 rose camelias, heliotropes, &c., and he is but one of a large number engaged in this business.

What to Eat.-We commend the following report of an experiment made by an eminet New York physician in his own family and practice:— He says from May to December, he habitually restricts his family and all his patients to two ounces each of animal food per day urging them to use vegetables freely during the summer. Having for twenty years kept a record of the matter he estimates the mortality in the meat eating families at about four times as great as in those households which have faithfully followed the
