It will of course be observed that the expenditures of the Institusion during the present year, greatly exceed those of any previous year. This was unavoidable, under the great advance in the price of every article used or consumed. The products the farm constitute a compartively small portion of the consumption of the House, which necessarily leaves every thing else to be bought at the present enormous prices. Besides this, the number of inmates is coastantly increasing, and the Directors cannot well see how the annual expenditures could be less under existing circumstances. It is also proper to state that at least five hundred dollars, charged in the present year, is fairly chargeable to the year, 1868; the expenditures having occurred in that year, but unavoidably remained unsettled at the last account.

The Directors, however, have an increased confidence that even under the present high prices, the actual cost to the public, is far less than under the old system.
