**ORDINANCE NO. 23.**

WHEREAS, by an act of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania passed the 15th day of April, A. D. 1852, extending the provisions of the act regulating boroughs passed the 24th day of April, A. D. 1834 to the Borough of Waynesboro'; therefore be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Waynesboro', and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that next ensuing, the owner or owners of lots or lots, on both sides of South Street, from Leistersburg Street to Broad Street, shall set up, or cause to be set up, good and sufficient curb-stone, to extend where set up eight inches above the surface of the said street, also grade their pavements with the said street, and pave the same with brick, or stone slabs, to the breadth of six feet from the range of the curb inward, within sixty days after the first day of September next. And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that any lot on said street remaining uncurbed, ungraded, or unpaved, at the expiration of said time, the corporate officers shall cause the same to be done, on pain of the owner or owners thereof within the time prescribed by the above regulations, and to collect the cost of labor and materials, with twenty per cent. advance thereon from said owners as claimers are by law recoverable under the provisions of the law relative to mechanics liens, &c. Passed the 11th day of August, A. D. 1873.


