New Postal Arrangement.

It is provided that on and after the first of July, 1855, letters alleged to be valuable shall be registered at the office of mailing, by the applicant, upon the payment of a fee of twenty-fivé cents. Postmusters are to keep a réceipt book, similar to a bank check book. The receipt is to be given to the applicant, 1 00 and a description, with date, name, where sent and to whom, is to be entered on the margin. Receipted letters are not to be entered in the ordinary mail accounts, but sep-1 00 arately; a letter bill for each registered let-1 00 ter is to be sent, separate from the letter. to 1 00 the Postmaster, which in large offices is to be opened by himself or confidential clerk. In all large offices, letters received before the hour of mailing are to be placed in a secure 2 00 place of deposit, until the time for closing the mails, when each package is to be sealed with wax at the tie, and placed in the bag at the latest moment.

At the distributing offices the letters are to be compared with the bill by a confidential clerk, who is to endorse the bill if correct, 2 00 and note the error if it be not correct. The confidential clerk is to pass all regisiered letters to a receiving clerk, who enters the date 1 00 and description upon his book, and makes 2 00 out a return bill to the office of mailing, acknowledging the receipt of the package. On the receipt of the package at the office of de-1 00 livery, the letter bill and the postage bill will 2 00 be compared, and a return bill will at once 1 00 be sent to the office from whence it has been received. If there be any discrepancy, or if 2 00 an important letter is missing, the Department is to employ the telegraph to ascertain the cause. On the delivery of a letter, a re-1 00 2 00 cept is to be taken from the person authori-2 00 side to receive it, and filed at that office.

1 00 A Catholic Priest and His Wife. The Chicago Tribune of the 11th inst., gives a curious account of the marriage of a Catholic priest, Nicholas Stamber, of that 1 00 city, to a young German girl, and her deser-1 00 tion of him. The marriage was performed 2 00 in private by a Catholic priest, according to 1 00 the rites of the Church, excepting the wed-2 00 ding ring and witnessess. Both priests were then in orders, and continued to be to up the time of the wife's desertion. The wife occupied the place of a housekeeper or upper servant in the priest's family for about nine months, and received good treatment and wages for her services; but some three months since left her husband, being as she said, "talked into it," by her friends.

The married priest and the officiating one have been deposed from office, since the affai has become known. And now the husband brings a suit in chancery for the recovery of his wife. The wife is brought into Court and 1 00 interrogated by the presiding Judge, to whom 2 00 she reveals the above facts respecting her marriage, and also her reason for deserting her husband-that she did not consider the marriage legal or binding, because her husband was a priest t and that she had been educated in the belief that she could never go to heaven if she lived to marriage with a priest. The Court assured her that her marriage was perfectly legal; but left her free to choose between her parents and her husband; and 2 00 she resolutely chose her parents, refusing to listen to the earnest entreaties of her disconsolate and forsaken spouse.
