John H. Wheeler of North Carolina, appointed Minister to Central America, recently arrived at Philadelphia on his way to the Isthmus, bringing with him three slaves-a mother and her two young boys, whom he designed to take with him on his mission. The intelligent mother had some general notion that her removal to a free state by her master would entitle her legally to her freedom, and, on applying, though closely watched by her old muster, to some black servants at the holel where they stopped, was confirmed in that presumption. She thereupon resolved to get away from her muster on or before her arrival in New-York, and remain to enjoy her new lound freedom.

Wheeler, who kent his eve on his slaves almost perpetually, took them, considerably before 50'clock, down to the terry boat of the Camuen and Amboy Rantrozo, where he meated them on the upper deck and sat down beside them to awai, the time of starting.

Meantime, a negro servant ran from their late hotel to the office of the "Society for the relief of persons illegally held in Slavery. established soon after the Revolution by Benlamin Franklin, and others, and told the Secretary, Passmore Williamson, that a man had gone down to the Amboy boat with three pervery busy, told the black to go down to the boat and inform the persons so held by Wheler that they could be so held no longer, having been voluntarily brought by him into a and dur Wheeler's undestrable company, The negro started for the boat accordingly, but soon Williamson changed his mind and followed. He wen directly up to Wheeler and his late chatters, asked the woman if she wound to be tree, and, being assored that ane did, advised her of his rights and onnortunities.
