Appeal to Pennsylvanians.

A very grave and flagrant wrong was recently perpetrated on the soil of your State, which in its effects and consequences strikes at the rights and liberties of all.

John H. Wheeler of North Carolina, appointed Minister to Central America, recently arrived at Philadelphia on his way to the States, bringing with him three slaves—a mother and her two young boys, whom he designed to take with him on his mission.

Wheeler, who kept his eye on his slaves almost perpetually, took them, considerably before 5 o'clock, down to the ferry-boat of the Camden and Amboy Railroad, where he seated them on the upper deck and sat down beside them to await the time of starting.

Meantime, a negro servant ran from their late hotel to the office of the "Society for the relief of persons illegally held in Slavery," established soon after the Revolution by Benjamin Franklin, and others, and told the Secretary, Passmore Williamson, that a man had gone down to the Amboy boat with three negroes whom he was holding as slaves, and who desired their freedom.

Williamson being very busy, told the black to go down to the boat and inform the persons so held by Wheeler, that they could be so held no longer, having been voluntarily brought by him into a free state, and advise them to walk on shore and see Wheeler's underscratic company.

The negro returned to the boat accordingly, but soon Williamson changed his mind and followed. He went directly to Wheeler and his late chattens, asked the woman if she wanted to be free, and, being assured that she did, advised her of her rights and opportunities. She started to go; but when she gathered around them, and coming to their master to terror, a scuffle ensued between him and the half-breed blacks who had crowded to the scene, by whom they were carried off in the train of their mother, who was eager for liberty.

They all quickly disappeared, and Mr. Williamson went back to his office, where he was absorbed in his own business. At 10 o'clock, when he left for the Pittsburg station and took the night-train to Harrisburg, where he had to attend a meeting, he telegraphed company next day.

When he returned to Philadelphia, thirty-six hours later, he was met by officers who arrested him on a habeas corpus issued by U. S. District Judge Kane, at the suit of relation of Wheeler, commanding him to produce the bodies of the woman and children, and to answer before the said Judge—Wheeler having charged him with obstructing and securing them. To this suit, Williamson responded by personal appearance before the Judge and by affidavit setting forth that the said Jane Johnson and her children, claimed by Wheeler as his slaves, had never been in his (Williamson's) custody or keeping, and he knew not where they were.

This verified answer Judge Kane pronounced evasive and a contempt of Court, and therefore sentenced Williamson to prison without bail or limit of duration. Mr. W.'s counsel forthwith applied for permission to amend the return; but the Judge refused it, saying it was too late, from the hour, two months since, Williamson has lain in jail, though every effort has been made by eminent counsel to procure his liberation. An application in his behalf to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court for habeas corpus was refused last by Judge Lewis, and afterwards by the full bench—Judge Knox Brown's dissenting—on the ground of independent jurisdiction in the Federal Courts, involving the right to punish for contempt; the Court holding that there is no remedy for an abuse of this right, however flagrant, but through an impeachment. So Williamson lies in prison, without hope of release, and is insupportably told that he can liberate himself by making a proper submission to Kane.
