SCHOOLS.—By the above statement it appears that there are 203 Schools, and 19 still wanting, according to the judgment of the Directors. Doubless new schools will yet have to be organized and the location of old ones changed. But were the School houses located as they should be, both for accommoda-tion and economy, a much less number would be much better. In the item, "average number of months taught." Some districts have reported the months taught by private subscription also. If these were deducted from the public Schools, the general average would be less than five months public Schools.

TEACHERS -It will be seen that we have more than twice as many Females as Male teachers; and that their wages are nol half as high. In every dis trict we believe, but two, the teacher "boards around," and hence the salaries are put down at what it netts the teacher. Add the board, and the general wages of teachers in this county, are for Mades, \$28 and for Females \$17 per month.

SCHOLARS .- Note the difference between the number of male and female scholars. Does this betoken a low estimate of female education in this Co ? The great disparity in the cost of educating each scholar per month in different districts is accounted for by the diverse methods of making out district re-ports. The general average is not far from the truth for each district. We think the cost of school houses should come in this item, as it is really a part of the current expense of educating each scholar. This included, the cost of educating each scholar per month will be 60 cents.

RECEIPTS.—The above statement does not show as we think it ought to, the per cent levied by each district. Many of the districts we know lay the tax at the highest limit 13 mills per dollar. Most of the assessments were hid before the pre-cent valuation of 1855 was made. The average tax was much higher therefore than when applied to the present valuation. \$2,318,341, real and personal property. If we average the assessments of all the districts on this latest valuation, we find it amonnts to about 9 mills on the dollar. If the calculation was made upon the valuation, on which the tax was really laid, we think it would amount to 8 mills on the dollar. If there is auchter county that has haid such a tax on their property for school purposes we would like to hear of it. It any of our older counties, and especially any of them embracing cities or large towns, have leviced a tax of one half the above per cent it would do us good to know it. Respectfully submittee. J. 
