

Enemies of the Corn Crop.

Unlike wheat and nearly every other cer cal, the enconies of corn, work chiefly in the earlier stages of the growing crop. Spring frosts, the cut, and the wire worm, the crow, weeds, cold rains &c., tell upon the corn, if at all early in the season. It is true that a cold bad summer has its influence, and autumnal frosts pow and then come untimely; but in the warm dry season of our climate, both of these dangers can be mostly guarded against or counteracted. There is more fear of drouth in mid-summer, than of too excessive moisture, and both these extremes are most effectually prevented by the same identical treatment, viz : drainage and deep thor ough culture. The more porous and deep soil is, the more water it is capable of hold. ing in suspension as a protection against long rainless seasons; and when water is in excess, the surplus portion filters through into the drains below, and passes harmlessly away.

The wire worm is a grievous annoyance in many localities, not unfrequently ruining the crop by destroying the seed before it has time to germinate. Many remedies have been prescribed for the evil, and have been pracneed with varied success. A year or so ago a farmer in the western part of this county, stated to us that the most effectual remedy he had found, was the use of hog manure, assuring us that he had tried it repeatedly, and with invariable success. It might be applied, he said, broadcast and plowed under or the corn might be manured in the hill. He preferred the former course, as more likely to secure future crops against the depredator. So confident was he of the remedy, that in addition to publishing his statement in the Rural, we made application to an agricultural friend, and requested him to test the matter. He had, he stated, a spot of an acre or so in extent, upon which the year before the wire-worm entirely destroyed the crop, besides committing great ravages in other portions of the field Upon this, he promised to try the experiment, and did so, last season with entire success, as he assured us.

He spread hog mannre from his pen over the "infected district," and did not lose a hill o corn from the ravages of the worm. He has great confidence in the remedy, and insists that it will prove entirely effectual. One thing is certain, and that is, no harm can arise from the application. Unlike some remedies, which, if they do not cure are sure to kill, and as a general thing take that horn of the dilemma, this application of hog manure will be invaluable as a fertilizer, if it does nothing more; and we hope others of our readers, whose fields are troubled with this pesi, will test the matter by further experiments. One swallow does not make a summer, and one successful result will not establish a principle. If similar trials are had in different parts of the country, with corresponding success, we may then reasonably conclude that the remedy is certain; if results vary, but all prove more or less successful, we may consider it efficacious under certain circumstances, and must then discover what those circumstances are. We will youch, for its value as a manure, at all events, and warrant, either directly or indirectly, a full return for the cost and trouble expended.

Having read several communications in the Farmer on making good butter, and not seeing any that comes up to my ideas, I will now give my practice, (or rather that of my wife,) and some of the causes of not making good butte:

1. Milk should never be set for butterin a dark.; damp cellar-as is the case with butter. makers in this section-as the cream is thereby moulded before it has time to rise, which gives the butter a mouldy taste.

2. The milk is allowed to set too long before being skimmed, which gives it a cheesy tasic

3. The cream is kept too long, before it is skimmed, which gives it the taste of the other two; and also a sour taste.

4. The butter should never be washed in water because it takes away that beautiful aroma so essential in good butter.

5. It should never be taken in a person's hands, as the heat melts a certain portion of the globules, which gives it an oily taste, and makes it become rancid very soon.

6. The milk should be set in good clean tin or earthern pans, in a dry, open, airy and shady place, above ground, if possible, although a cellar may be so built and ventilated, as to answer the purpose. It should never be set over twenty-four hours in warm weather; and for a dairy of three cows or more, the cream should be churned every morning and never be kept over forty-eight hours, in warm weather ; in cold weather it may be kept longer. It should always be about the same heat that the milk is when drawn from the cow, and churned steadily, and I have never known it to fail of coming readily; it is then taken from the churn with a wooden butter ladle, into a wooden tray, which has been well scalded and cooled in pure cold waters ; the salt is then worked in, to suit the taste, with the ladle, which is easily done, with a little practice, and the buttermilk well worked out; it is then set away in a cool place for about twenty-four hours, when it is well worked over again, as long as milk or pickle can be worked out. Butter made in this way and put down in stone pots, and kept from the air, will keep good for a long time. Č. S. W.

REMEDY FOR GIRDLED TREES .- As it has been a good winter for mice to work at fruit trees, on account of the snow, I wish to make known a remedy. In March, 1855, as the snow was going off, I found four of my apple trees completely girdled by the mice nearly a foot from the ground. I took a shovel and made a mound of dirt around two of them. Last fall I dug down and found them barked over. One of them bore several apples; both are doing well. The other two are both DORK: PORK !- 20 bbls of Mess Pork, dead. They should be seen to at once.
