I hear a rumor that Col. Lane has been arrested at the town of Atchison. I do not believe it. Some persons were sent up here for the arms taken by Col. Cooke from the Eldridge train last Fall, under Gov. Geary's orders. I believe the parties who came for them had an order from Gov. Geary, which has been sent up here by Mr. Thaddeus Hyatt to the brother in law of Gov. Geary, who is still here. The arms were delivered, and were taken away in wagons quietly, without exciting observation. The cannon taken by the troops with the men captured at Hickory Point, has been here on the Capitol Hill all Winter, but lately it has disappeared. The Law-and-Order men here have hidden it.

The weather has been cool. Emigrants still arrive, but not so numerously- Breadstuffs and everything else are rising. The Missouri River is reported as being quite high for the season, having risen rapidly of late. It will be in good stage now till midsummer.

Be it ordsined by anthority of the Burgess and Town Coancil of the Borough of Knoxville and it is hereby enacted by anthority of the same: That from and after the due publication of this Ordinance, no horses, cattle, sheep or swine shall be saffered to run at large within the boundaries of said Borough under the following penalties. viz: For every horse, colt. mare or gedling 50 cents; for every head of cattle (by which in this Ordinance are meant oxen, bulls, stage, steers, heifers, cows and caives) 50 cents; for every hog, swine or shoat 25 cents; for every sheep or lamb 25 cents, for each and every time they may be taken running at large within the boundaries of the Borough after said. Provided however that cattle may be pe milted to run at large in any of the streets of the Borough during the following hours, viz: from 6 o'clock to 9 o'clock A. M. and from 5 o'clock to 8 o'clock P. M. from the first day of May to the last day of November inclusive without incurring the penaltics storesaid.

And be it further ordained by authority of the same, that when any sheep or swine shall be found running at large in the streets of said Borough it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner and the privilege of any citizen of the Borough, to take up, impound and safely keep the same in any suitable place, yard or enclosure within the limits of said Borough. In the property at public sale to the highest and bost bidder, after giving at least five days notice by written or printed advertisements, put up at four of the most public places in said Borough. That when any horses or cattle shall be found running at large within the boundaries of the Borough aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner and the privilege of any citizen of the Borough, to take up, impound and safely keep the same in any suitable place, yard or enclosure within the houndaries of the Borough, and no person appearing to claim the same and pay the fine, costs and expenses of keeping within twenty-four hours, he shall forthwith give public notice by four writen or printed advertisement-sput up in the most public place in said Borough and if within five days from such notice no person shall appear to claim them he shall proceed to give notice in the nearest newspaper published in the county for at least four weeks of such impounding and that the same will be sold at a time and place specified in said notice which shall be at least slxty days after said horses or cattle are impounded, and if no person appears before the day of sale to claim said horses or cattle and pay the fines penalties and costs incurred thereon, the Street Commissioner shall sell them at public sale to the highest and best bidder and pay the proceeds of sale to the treasurer of said Borough by him to be disposed of in the same manner as in the case of the sale of sheep and hogs in Sec. 2, provided always that if the said commissioner shall believe that any one of the boroses or cattle are of less value than ten dollars he shall cause the same to be appraised by two disinterested citizens of the Borough upon oath and if upon such appraisement they shall be of less value than ten dollars he shall be as follows, Viz.
