An Ordinance
To prevent Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Hogs and Geese
from running at large in the Boro of Mansfield. § 1. Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of Mansfield, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same, that from and after the due publication of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for the owner or owners of any horse, mare, or geld-

ing, cattle, sheep, hogs or geese, to permit or suffer the same to ran at large in said borough. § 2. That, the owner or owners of any horses, cattle or hogs, who shall permit, or suffer the same cattle or hogs, who shall permit, or suffer the same to run at large in said borough, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty cents, at the suit of any person, for the use of said horough of Mansfield, for each and every head, and for each and every offence; and the owner or owners of any sheep or geese, who shall permit the same to run at large in said borough, shall forfeit and pay the sum of ten cents for each and every and of said sheep or geese, and for each and every offence, to be recovered as aforesaid. Prapided, that milch cows may be permitted to run at large in said borough from sunrise in the morning till nue o'clock at night, from the first of April to till nine o'clock at night, from the first of April to the first of December of each and every year.
