

RESOLUTION,
PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CON-STITUTION OF THE COMMON BALTH—tracked by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Lommonwealth of Pennsylvanian General Anembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof

There thereot.

FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to co designated as article eleven, as follows:—
ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

be designated as article eleven, as follows:

SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to supply earnal deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as sforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law—The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, no rear of a such as formation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to crable the state to repel invasion, suppress domest

There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:

Alticle XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established containing less than four hundred square milos.

Any city containing a sufficient number of taxable-inhabitants in the several parts thereof except that any county containing at least three thousand tids rice to the state two representative."
