RESOLUTION,
PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEAUTH.—herobrod by
the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth
of Prinsplannia in General Assembly med. That the followingamendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth
article thereof.

TREE AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:

ARTICLE M.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other

contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law—The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in sympress domestic Insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its purpose the shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, or or say corporation or association; unless such debt shall

resent indebtedness.
Section 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county SECTION 1. The legislature small not authorize any county city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution or party.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:

OF NEW COUNTIES. No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established containing less than four hundred square miles.

FOURTH AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional section to the first articles and constitution, which shall be numbered and read as lows:

SECTION 26. The legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul, any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner however, that no injustics shall be done to the corporators.
