mendments are proposed to the constitutiom of the com-nonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article elevan, as follows:

ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. SECTION 1. The state may contract dobts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other nurpose whether.

Sec. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the maney arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other names a wholener.

Section 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, barough or township or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall


