RESOLUTION,
PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CON-

STITETION OF THE COMMONWEALTH.—it solved by the Senate and H use of Representatives of the (omnonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

TRST AMEXIMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:—
ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DESTS.

ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

SECTION I. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenees, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and afty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Secros 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Secros 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of tokes owned by the state, or the proceeds of sale of atokes owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law—The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or i
