**RESOLUTION**, **PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CON**. STITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALING-arsolved by the Senate and H-use of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvenia in General Assensibly met. That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the com-monwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

THEST AMENDMENT. THEST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to sold constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:-ARTICLE IL OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not other-wise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more sets of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven huadred and fifty thousand doltars, and the money arising from the greation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was ob-tained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever. SEC. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indeluteness of the state: but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for purpose whatever.

contracting of auch debts, shall be applied to the parpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other parpose whaterer. Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legisla-ture shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruips interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hun-dred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund eshall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or pro-ceeds of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law.--The sail sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the case of war, invasion or insur-rection, no part of the saies of war, invasion or insur-rection, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or ap-plied otherwise than in extinguishment of the sull cell. until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars. Sectiors 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be bledged, or loaned to, any individ-ual, company, corporation or association; nor shall the com-

BYCTION 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be Bledged, or loaned to, any individ-ual, company, asportation or association; nor shall the com-monwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation. SECTION 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough or township or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel iurasion, suppress domestic insurrection. defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness. SECTION 7. The legislaturo shall not authorize any county city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stock-holder in any company, association or corporation, associ-ntion, institution or party. SECOND ANYMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows: OF AURING COUNTREED

ARTICLE XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over ope tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or other-wise.) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be stablished containing less than four hundred square miles. the electors thereof; nor shall and is with county, by a third of the electors thereof; nor shall and is with county be established containing less than four bundred square miles. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representative." At the end of section serven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia halb be divided into single sentorial district, of contiguous territory, of equal taxable population as pear as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative." The leci-lature, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into sentorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to remain unchanged until the ap-
