

"The undersigned, members of the committee, do "The undersigned, members of the committee, do respectfully report, that we suw the two Safes origi-nally agreed upon by Farrels & Herring and Evans & Watson, placed side by side in a furnace, viz: The Safe in use by the Paymaster of the Philadel-phia and Reading Railroad Company, in his office at Reading, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and the safe in use by H. 


