27, 1857. "The undersigned, members of the committee, do "Ine undersigned, members of the committee, do respectfully report, that we saw the two Safes originally agreed upon by Farrels & Herring and Evans & Watson, placed side by side in a turnace, viz: The Safe in use by the Paymaster of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company, in his office at Reading, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and the safe in use by H. A. Lantz in his store, manufactured by Evans & Watson, and put in books

manufactured by Evans & Watson, and put in books and papers precisely alike.

The fire was started at 83 o'clock, A.
