In the Executive Department, the South has a majority, and likewise in the Federal Judiciary.

In fact, the South, though much weaker than the North in wealth, commerce, population and all the important interests and elements that make up a great nation, has complete possession of our National Government—has possession of nearly all the chief offices, the most influential positions in Congress, a majority in the Cabinet and Judiciary, and the control of the dominant party in the nation.

She is in a position to dictate terms to the North on every question, and to drive the North into every measure that she may deem fit to propose.
