



the farmer thinks he ought to pay. At this present time it seems to be conceded by all that the cash value of good wheat is St per bushel; buckwheat, 2 to 2-6; con 3-6 to 4-6; bushel; buckwheat, 2 to 2-6; corn 3-6 to 4-6; oats, 2 to 2-6; butter, 14 to 16 cents.
