

at Reading, manufactured by Farrels & Herring,

manufactured by Evans & Watson, and put in books
and papers precisely alike:

The fire was started at 85 o'clock, A. M., and

kept up until four cords of green hickory, two cords dry oak and half chestnut top wood were entirely consumed, the whole under the superintendence of the subscribers, members of the Committee.
