

FROM KANSAS.

Lawrence, K. T., April 17, 1858. I learn from Fort Scott that the United States troops have left that place. They have gone to Fort Leavenworth to prepare for the Utah expedition.

Public meetings to ratify and sustain the Leavenworth Constitution are beginning to be held. There is to be one at Prairie City to-day, and one at Lawrence.

Young Girl in a Trance forty-eight hours.—About 10 o'clock last Thursday night, a young girl named Isabelle Ellison, residing in Washington street, Poughkeepsie, while at the altar of a Methodist church in that city, suddenly lifted up her hands and fell backwards, apparently dead.

On Saturday evening a number of her friends were in the house singing her favorite hymn, when she suddenly lifted up her hand, crying out "glory! hallelujah!" She then turned to one of her friends, and calling her by name, said "repent, repent. Oh, if you had seen what I have, you would not live another moment in your sins, but would pray to God to have mercy upon you.

On Friday night a number of persons visited the house, and remained singing and praying until daylight. The young woman was very weak when she awoke out of the trance, but was stronger yesterday morning, and attended church. The case has caused considerable excitement in Poughkeepsie.

Burnt to Death—Shocking Carelessness.—On Saturday last, near York, Pennsylvania, a little son of George Reibling was burnt to death. The father, assisted by another man, was engaged in burning brush, which had been collected at different places in the field, and had several stacks burning at once.

Sixty of Decay—And of Hope.—The Admission of Kansas under the Lecompton Constitution passed the Senate by Ayes 33, Nays 25. The Fugitive Slave Bill passed the Senate in 1850 by a vote of 27 Ayes and 12 Nays, and the Nebraska Bill repealing the Missouri Compromise passed the same body in 1854 by Ayes 37, Nays 14.

They are digging an Artesian well at Columbus, Ohio, of which the following account is given: "The well is now, (February 6) 440 feet deep; the cliff limestone is passed through, and they are now at work in the blue limestone of the Cincinnati region, a stratum of which is variously estimated at from 400 to 1,000 feet of thickness.
