Some of the Border-Ruffians about Fort Scott left incontinently about the time the troops did. Those who recently murdered the Free State men in the Osage Valley, or the parties suspected of doing it, have fled to Missouri, and I have been informed that it was well for them they did. The Pro Slavery men down there are getting scared, and I think they are about tired of their operations. Court is to be held at Fort Scott next week, and there are a great many "rebellion" cases.

Public meetings to ratify and sustain the Leavenworth Constitution are beginning to be held. There is to be one at Prairie City today, and one at Lawrence. In a few neighborhoods' the black-law men endeavor to get up an agitation against the Constitution .--This opposition is not very extensive, and comes only from a few individuals. The Free-State party, as a party, will sustain the Constitution. The few who venture to oppose are of those who would have agreed to "take the Lecompton Constitution to change it." The few Administration men are urging that there will surely be an enabling act of Congress, and that the action under it will supersede this Constitution.



YOUNG GIRL IN A TRANCE FORTY-EIGHT HOURS .- About 10 o'clock last Thursday night, a young girl named Isabella Ellison, residing in Washington street, Poughkeepsie, while at the altar of a Methodist church in that city, suddenly lifted up her hands and fell backwards, apparently dead. Several persons immediately ran to her assistance, and raised her, when to their horror they discovered that her eyes were glazed and set, her features pale as marble, her lips colorless, and her feet and hands cold as those of a corpse. It was shortly discovered that she vet breathed, when she was conveyed to her residence, the preacher saving that she was in a trance, and when a member advised that medical assistance should be procured, he objected, saying, "the Lord has placed her in this mysterious state, and he will, at his own time, raise her to testify to his goodness."

She remained in this state until Saturday evening, excepting a slight movement which occurred on Friday afternoon, when she litted up her hand and made three or four efforts to clutch something, when the arm fell back over the head-board of the bed. Two or three of the women who were in the house at the time attempted to replace the arm upon the bed, but were unable to bend or move it.

On Saturday evening a number of her friends were in the house singing her favorite hymn, when she suddenly lifted up her hand, crying out "glory ! hallelujah !" She then turned to one of her friends, and calling her by name, said "repent, repent. Oh, if you had seen what I have, you would not live another moment in your sins, but would pray to God to have mercy upon you. I have been in Heaven; it is lit up with the glory of God, and around the throne were thousands of angels, singing sweetly the praises of the King of Heaven. By and by Jesus came and spoke to me. I also saw the great gulf, but could scarcely see the bottom of it."

BURNT TO DEATH-SHOCKING CARELESS-NESS.-On Saturday last, near York, Pennsylvania, a little son of George Reibling was burnt to death. The father, assisted by another man, was engaged in burning brush, which had been collected at different places is the field, and had several stacks burning at once. While so engaged it was discovered that the child who had been at one of the brush heaps, was burning in a blaze. Reibling rescued the child, whose stockings and clothing prevented any serious bodily injuries from the burning. Provoked at the child for his mishap, the father took him to the house, where there were no inmates, and, throwing the child on a bed, departed to his work in the field. Some minutes elapsed, when the man who assisted Reibling directed the attention of the latter to the cloud of smoke coming out of the house. On reaching the building it was found that the child, still in bed, was completely surrounded by fire, with all his clothes in a blaze. When rescued the child was burnt almost to a crisp -the head completely bare of hair-and survived only three or four hours.
