In a late discourse to an unusually large audience in Peterboro, New York, Gerrit Smith spoke as follows on the future state:

I arraigned our clergyman for holding that the doctrine of an eternal hell must be believed in, order to secure salvation. For be the doctrine true or false, I cannot think that we shall be either saved or lost by any views we may entertain of it. I now arraign them for their undoubting faith in it. No them for their undoubting faith in it. No warrant have they either to preach or en- Ageneral assortment of School Books, Blank Books. tertain a faith in it which is free from all

I confess - perhaps to my shame and condemnation—that I do not feel a deep and abiding interest in the next stage of our being. Far less concerned am I to know what is the future state, than to know and "do" the duties of the present.

I believe in future punishment. It is a reasonable doctrine. It is philosophically and necessarily true. Everywhere our character must determine our condition.--Every man, on dying, must go to his own place-to the place for which his character fits him. The death of his body can no more affect him than the breaking of his spectacles or cane. His body, no more than his spectacles or cane, is a part of himself. That his character will surely remain eternally unchanged. I deny that one has a right to affirm. Jude teaches that persons fall from heaven. Why then may they not rise from hell? for aught we can know there may be room in the life to come for repentance as well as apostacy. In one sense of "everlasting punishment," I am an undoubting believer in it, for I cannot doubt that the punishment of the sinner will be everlasting as his sin.

Whilst I confess that I have no certain apprehensions of the kind, or degree, or continuance of either future punishment of future enjoyment, I nevertheless confidently maintain that enough knowledge for me and for all men is, that in life to come "it shall be well" with the righteous, and "ill" with the wicked'; and that "the Judge of all the earth will do right," as well there as here. While earth is our home, let us discharge with alacrity and delight the duties of earth. In that way, and in that way only, shall we get to heaven.

I spoke of the future as a place I had perhaps better called it a state. That there are nullions of heavens and millions of hells that they are, in short, as numerous as are the difference in moral character, better answers my conception.

FEELINGS WHEN A LADY FRIEND GETS MARRIED .- We never have seen expressed the sentiment of lest-behind-ativeness, which is experienced by bachelors at belles being carried off by others, till the publication; the other day, of a letter of the celebrated Thomas Paine. In writing to one of his fair acquaintances who had become a bride, he says: When I see my female friends drop off by matrimouv, I am sensible of something that affects me like a loss. In spite of all the appearance of joy, I cannot help mixing the compliment of regret with those of congratulation. It appears as if I had outlived or lost a friend. It seems to me as if the original was no more, and that she is changed to forsake the circle and forget the scenes of former society. Felicities and cares superior to those she formerly cared for, present for her a new landscape of life, that excludes the little friendship of the past. It is so not every lady's mind that is sufficiently capacious to prevent those greater objects from crowding out the less, or that can spare a thought to former friendship, after she has given her hand and heart to the man that
