ALL FROM A STEEPLE—ONE MAN KILLED BY A LIGHTNING ROD.—A correspondent of the Louisville Democrat, writing from Carpentersville, Ind., says: Mr. Logan, while erecting a lightning-rod to the Presbyterian Church in town, was pitched from a height of one hundred feet by the breaking of a ladder, into his rod and tumbled below, breaking both his legs, fracturing his skull, and mutilating his body in the most horrible manner. His downward, penetrated the eye of O. S. P. Church, who, (an elder of the O. S. P. Church,) prostrated him to the earth, stunning him. Mr. Logan has since expired. Other gentlemen are suffering very much, considered dangerously hurt."
