WHAT CAN BE DONE ON AN ACRE OF GROUND .-- The editor of the Maine Cultivator published a few days ago his management of one acre of ground, from which we gather the following result :

One-third of an acre of corn usually produced thirty bushels of sound corn for grinding besides some refuse. This quantity was sufficient for family use, and for fattening one large or two small hogs. From the same ground he obtained two or three hundred pumpkins, and his family supply of beans. From the same bed of six rods equare he usually obtained sixty bushels of onions; these he sold at \$1 per bushel, and the amount purchassed his flour. Thus from one-third of an acre and his onion bed, he obtained his breadstuffs. The rest of the ground was appropriated to all sorts of vegetables for the summer and winter use-potatoes, beets, turnips, cabbage, green corn, peas, beans, cucumbers, melons, squashes, &c., with fifty or sixty bushels of beets and carrots for the winter food of a cow. Then he had a flower garden, also raspberries currants and gooseberries, in great variety, and a few choice apple, pear, plum, cherry, peach and quince trees.


