POSTAGE OF THE COTTON LORDS. The receipts of the Post Office Departs ment can be made to approach or to equal its expenditures only by means of the legislation of Congress. In applying any remedy, care should be taken that the people shall not be deprived of the advantages which they are fairly entitled to receive from the Post Office Department,
