ACCIDENT AND LOSS OF LIFE.—At about three o'clock on Saturday afternoon last, WILLIS, the youngest son of Hon. L. I. NICHOLS fell from a sleigh upon which he had jumped to ride, near the upper bridge in this village. (The sleigh which was heavily loaded with sand, passed over his body, fatally injuring him. He lingered until about 7 o'clock in the evening and died. He was seven years of age. His funeral took place at 4 o'clock on Monday, was solemnly attended.
