ARE YOU GOING?—The Spring Term of the Academy commences Monday, April 2d, and continues fourteen weeks, as will be seen by the advertisement. The Trustees have certainly used discretion by changing the Academic year from four to three terms. The change is evidently advisable both as respects cheapness and efficiency, since the patrons thereby receive proportionately an increase of labor and consequently benefit for less money in the shape of tuition.
